#### THE NEXT LIFE GIVING ACTION

This practice of admitting one's defects to another person is, of course, very ancient. It has been validated in every century, and it characterizes the lives of all spiritually centered and truly religious people. But today religion is by no means the sole advocate of this saving principle. Psychiatrists and psychologists point out the deep need every human being has for practical insight and knowledge of his own personality flaws and for a discussion of them with an understanding and trustworthy person. So far as alcoholics are concerned, A.A. would go even further. Most of us would declare that without a fearless admission of our defects to another human being we could not stay sober. It seems plain that the grace of God will not enter to expel our destructive obsessions until we are willing to try this.

This vital Step was also the means by which we began to get the feeling that we could be forgiven, no matter what we had thought or done. Often it was while working on this Step with our sponsors or spiritual advisers that we first felt truly able to forgive others, no matter how deeply we felt they had wronged us. Our moral inventory had persuaded us that all-round forgiveness was desirable, but it was only when we resolutely tackled Step Five that we inwardly knew we'd be able to receive forgiveness and give it, too.

This feeling of being at one with God and man, this emerging from isolation through the open and honest sharing of our terrible burden of guilt, brings us to a resting place where we may prepare ourselves for the following Steps toward a full and meaningful sobriety.

## "Getting the Boot: How self-will run riot gave her a swift kick in the pants"

I acquired my first sponsor after hearing her lead at a meeting. She mentioned relationships in recovery, which was all I was really interested in at that time. I would scan the room for the cutest man and go after him. Relationships were a great distraction from learning a new way of life. I didn't have the ability to fully listen and learn during my first white-knuckle attempt at staying sober. I couldn't hear her warning of the dangers of getting involved with another recovering alcoholic. She had met her husband in the rooms of AA, and her marriage to him was a success. That was all I needed to hear. I had no idea that relationships required work and love! I just wanted one. I wanted someone to fill the emptiness in my life.

I asked her to be my sponsor that night. The next evening I called her from the backseat of a car on the way to a meeting. Her words went in one ear and out the other. I have no idea what she said that night because my new AA sweetheart was sitting next to me in the car. I thought I was "doing the right thing." My sponsor had said to call her no matter what, so that's what I did.

Needless to say, over the next year, she and I had many pointless conversations. She had the patience of a saint.

I was still married and having my recovery relationship on the side. This, to me, was not a problem—until my husband returned home from his recovery program and wanted to get back together. When I played one man against the other, my sponsor's patience wore thin. Finally one day she called me and said, "You are self-will run riot. I cannot sponsor you anymore."

I had gotten fired from a couple of jobs as a direct result of alcoholism before, and I equated my sponsor firing me to mean that I was fired from AA. I even asked a couple of our mutual women friends to sponsor me, and they said no. I kept this resentment for a long time, thinking she was wrong and callous for what she did.

I told my family I got fired from AA so I couldn't go back. Deep down I knew I was wrong, but I just did not want to go to any more meetings. I thought I could live my life like a "normal person" and stay sober. I did not need AA as a crutch.

Both relationships ended in disaster. My AA sweetheart got fed up and moved on. He's still sober today, and I am grateful. Sadly, my husband and I did not stay married or sober. All that time I spent scanning the rooms of AA instead of listening to the message, cost me dearly. When my sponsor said, "self-will run riot" I didn't care enough to ask what it meant. I did not heed warning after warning from her. It was impossible for me to be sponsored because I was closeminded, dishonest, and very unwilling to take suggestions or work the Steps. When I relapsed, I sank to an animal level.

Years later I wandered back into AA, humble and powerless. I got a new sponsor and a new way of life in a different area. One day I decided to email my former sponsor to make amends. She actually answered my email. I was shocked at her kindness toward me. She was overjoyed that I had made it back into the rooms of AA alive and that I was doing fairly well. Within a few months, I moved back to my hometown and told her I needed to find a sponsor in our area. I decided to ask her because she knew me so well. I held my breath, waited for a response, and she said, "Yes!" I never had a true friend like this until I started coming to AA.

Sometimes friends have to love you from a distance. Out of love, she "fired" me. Out of love, she "rehired" me. A true friend doesn't tell you want you want to hear—they tell you the truth, whether it's good or bad. Too bad it took years for me to realize just how much people cared.

(Excerpts from a letter received by an A.A. from a prisoner in San Quentin whom he had befriended by mail.)

. . .It is so nice to realize that I am not standing alone. For a long time I thought the world was against me when it was really I bucking the world. It took a long time and a lot of hard knocks to bring me to the understanding of "Things are not as we see them but as we are."

The past 26 months have been kind to me. I have enjoyed many good breaks but the greatest break I have ever had came when I really became a part of the A.A. program and through it, became acquainted with God and some of His greatest creations—friends, who gladly forgive and count future possibilities as greater than past performances.

I can truly say life began at 40 for me. Since that time I have enjoyed more of life than ever before. And, believe it or not, I have been far from unhappy, even though in prison. And, why shouldn't I be happy? I have good health, a love for and a desire to help others and I am surrounded with opportunities to exercise them. I have more freedom than millions who have never been behind bars, and though I possess only a few dollars, I am richer by far than many who possess millions.

If things work out, as I have hopes that they will, I will pay you a little visit before too many more months.
